Hello lovely students! You might have, at some point during your English learning, found yourself getting confused by the words drank and drunk. Perhaps you have used drunk rather than drank in the Past Simple tense. Or maybe you simply wanted to know what the correct past verb is for that glass of water you have just finished. If all of these sound like you, this guide on what the past tense of drink is will be very useful. Pouring water into a glass to drink Drink has two meanings and can be used in different ways in English. The first way is to use it as a noun. For example, coffee, water, soda, wine and juice are all types of drinks. Drinks is the plural of drink. Lets take a look at some examples of this. I had a drink last night and this morning I dont feel so well. I dont know what my favourite drink is, but I think it is coffee. This is drink as a noun and it is quite simple to follow. The second way to use drink, and the way we will be looking at it in this article, is in its verb form. The verb to drink means to swallow liquid. For instance, anytime you consume a liquid, you drink it. As English is often somewhat of a difficult language, we can say this: I drink a drink every morning. Dont be confused by this sentence. It only means you consume a beverage every morning. The first drink in this sentence is the verb, whilst the second drink is the noun. It makes perfect sense to us. Do you want to know the past forms of this verb? Look below. In the past simple tense, drink is drank. Do not confuse this word with drunk (more on that later). It is also important to remember, that as drink is not a regular verb, we do not say drank. Lets take a look at these examples I drank coffee everyday when I visited Colombia. We drank juice this morning. Dave drank a cup of tea last night and stayed awake because of it. Are you ready for a closer look at drink and the past participle? We use drunk as the past participle of drink (not drank). Drunk is commonly used with the perfect tenses, such as the present perfect and the past perfect. Lets see some sentences with both of these tenses. I have drunk four litres of lime cordial today. He has drunk wine before. Sunita has never drunk lemonade from the supermarket. She always makes her own. I had drunk juice before going to see the game. She had drunk a fizzy drink prior to feeling ill. Polina had drunk two bottles of water before competing in the marathon. Seems straightforward right? There is one more thing I would like to share with you before the end: drunk is also an adjective. Oddly enough, the word drunk also means intoxicated when used to describe someone that has drunk too much alcohol. Here are some examples. Erin was really drunk last night; she had two glasses of wine. I dont like to be drunk often. This adjective is used frequently in English. Fun fact: in the past, people used drank as the past participle and not drunk because the word drunk was associated with intoxication. Absolutely not! The English language seems to have an endless supply of confusing verb forms! But Im doing my best to demystify them one by one or, in this case, three in one shot! Ill tackle the verb drink and its past forms, drank and drunk, so theres no confusion over how to use them. Ill also touch on whether dranked is a word (spoiler alert: its not). Lets fill up on tips and quench your thirst for grammatical knowledge! Use drank when referring to an action completed in the past to form the simple past tense. and use drunk in combination with auxiliary verbs to form present perfect or past perfect tenses. Heres my quick tip for how I remember: if youre using has, have or had in a sentence, youll want to use drunk. The only exception is when youre clarifying the state someone is in, like She is drunk. Drink is the base form of the verb at hand and should be used in the present tense. The word drank is the past simple tense form of the verb drink, which is supposed to indicate a completed action in the past. He drank a cup of tea yesterday. Then theres drunk, the past participle form of drink. You should use it with auxiliary verbs like have or had as a verb phrase to form the present perfect and past perfect tenses. She has drunk all her coffee. They had drunk the lemonade before we arrived. No, dranked is absolutely not a word. I know it looks and sounds like it should be, but I promise its not. The correct past simple tense of drink is drank, and the past participle is drunk. Write that down. I drink coffee religiously every morning. My parents work from home and drink tea during their afternoon break. My daughter drinks water to stay hydrated without me telling her to. We always drink homemade milkshakes on hot summer days. My husband doesnt drink soda, so he drinks juice instead. I drank a glass of water before my run this morning. Candace drank her coffee while working on her laptop. We drank wine to celebrate our 15th wedding anniversary. My son drank a soda for the first time today and didnt like it. We drank milkshakes with the kids after our long hike. Candace has drunk three cups of coffee today and feels dizzy. The cat had drunk all the milk before I could even refill its darn bowl. Trust me, Ive drunk enough water to last me a lifetime. The kids have drunk their fair share of soda at the birthday party. My father is in recovery and hasnt drunk any alcohol in months. A simple word can cause a lot of chaos when used incorrectly, so its essential to study my guide and understand when and how to use all the forms of the irregular verb drink. I hope my tips were helpful! What is the past tense of drink? Most commonly, the past tense of the word drink is drank. Although the word form will change based on its participle. And the sentence where its used. For example, referencing drink in the present participle form will change it to drinking, but in the infinitive form, will be drink. What is the past tense of the word "drink" The past tense (past participle) form of drink is drank. The infinitive of the word form is drink. The present participle form is drinking. The past tense form is drank and past participle form is drunk. Understanding verb tenses The general grammar rules that govern past tenses are as follows. The simple past tense form is created by adding a -ed or -d affix to the root word of the verb. Some verbs use a -t variation where they end in a -t. For example, when "dream" turns into "dreamt." The past perfect tense is formed for regular verbs (ending in -ed, -d, or -t) by adding "had" followed by the verb. For example, "I had finished." The past continuous tense is formed by the verb "be" followed by the affix or ending of -ing. For example, "we were having dinner." Lastly, the past perfect continuous tense is formed by adding "had been" followed by the affix or ending of -ing. For example, "I had been building a castle with my sister."
